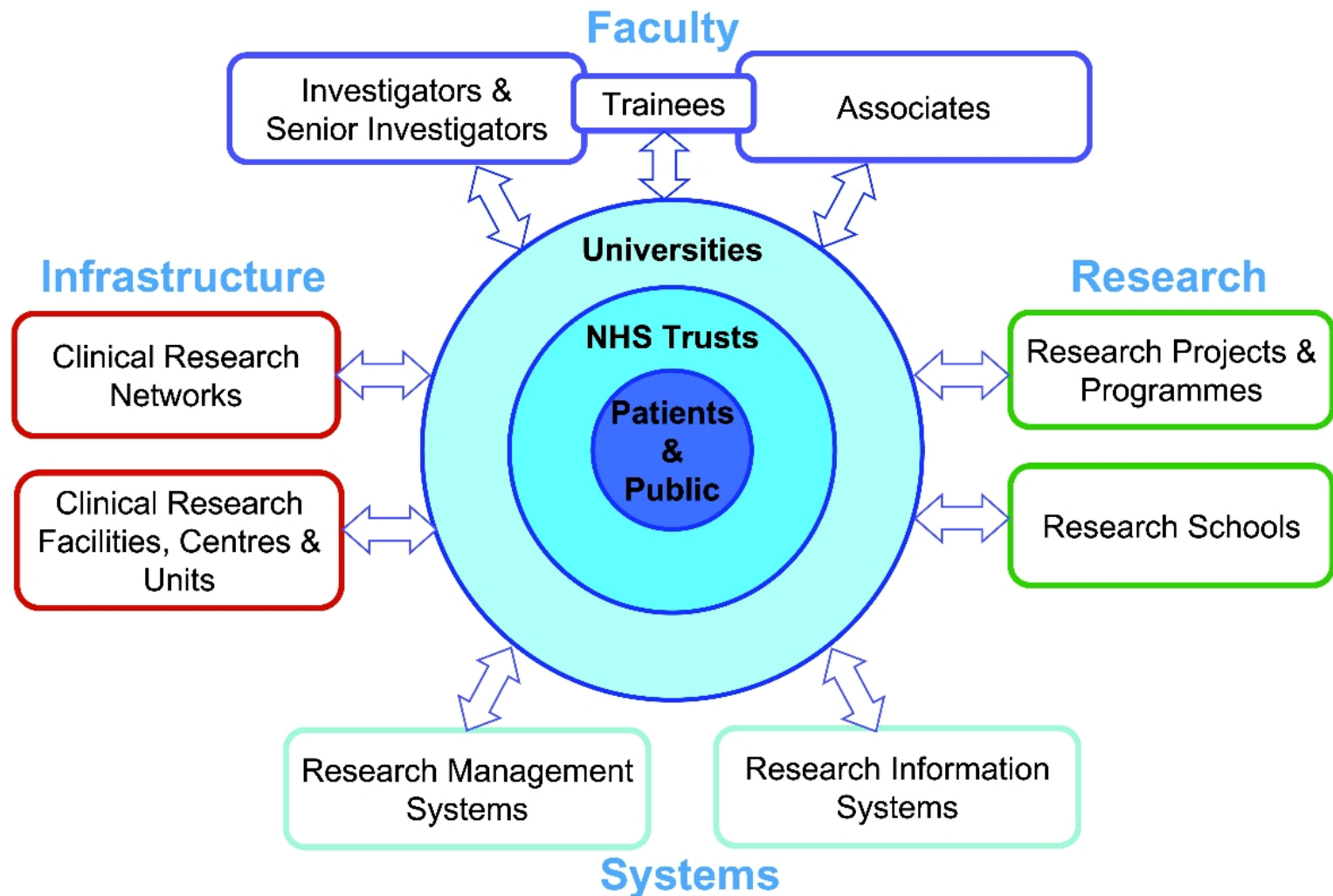




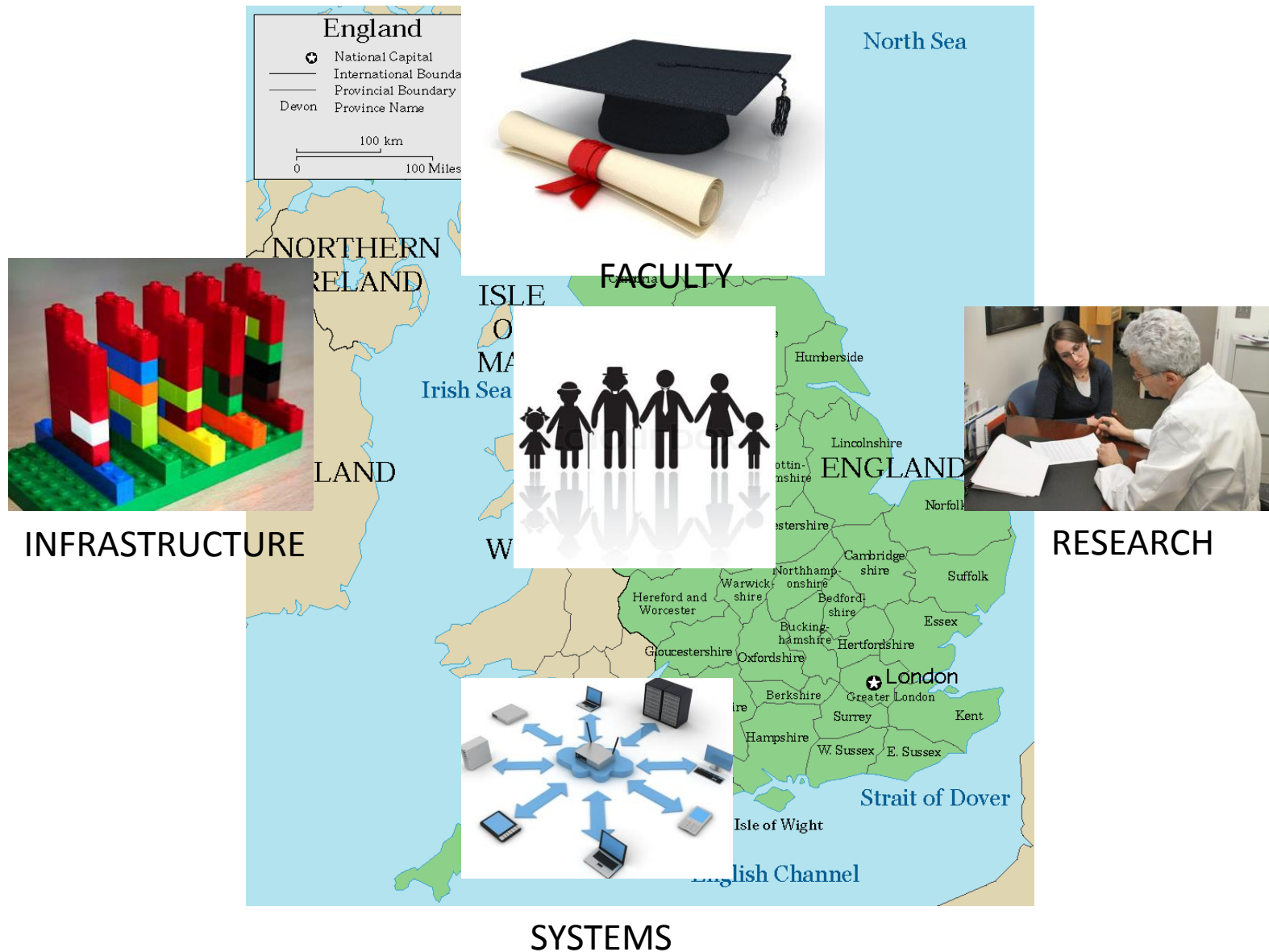

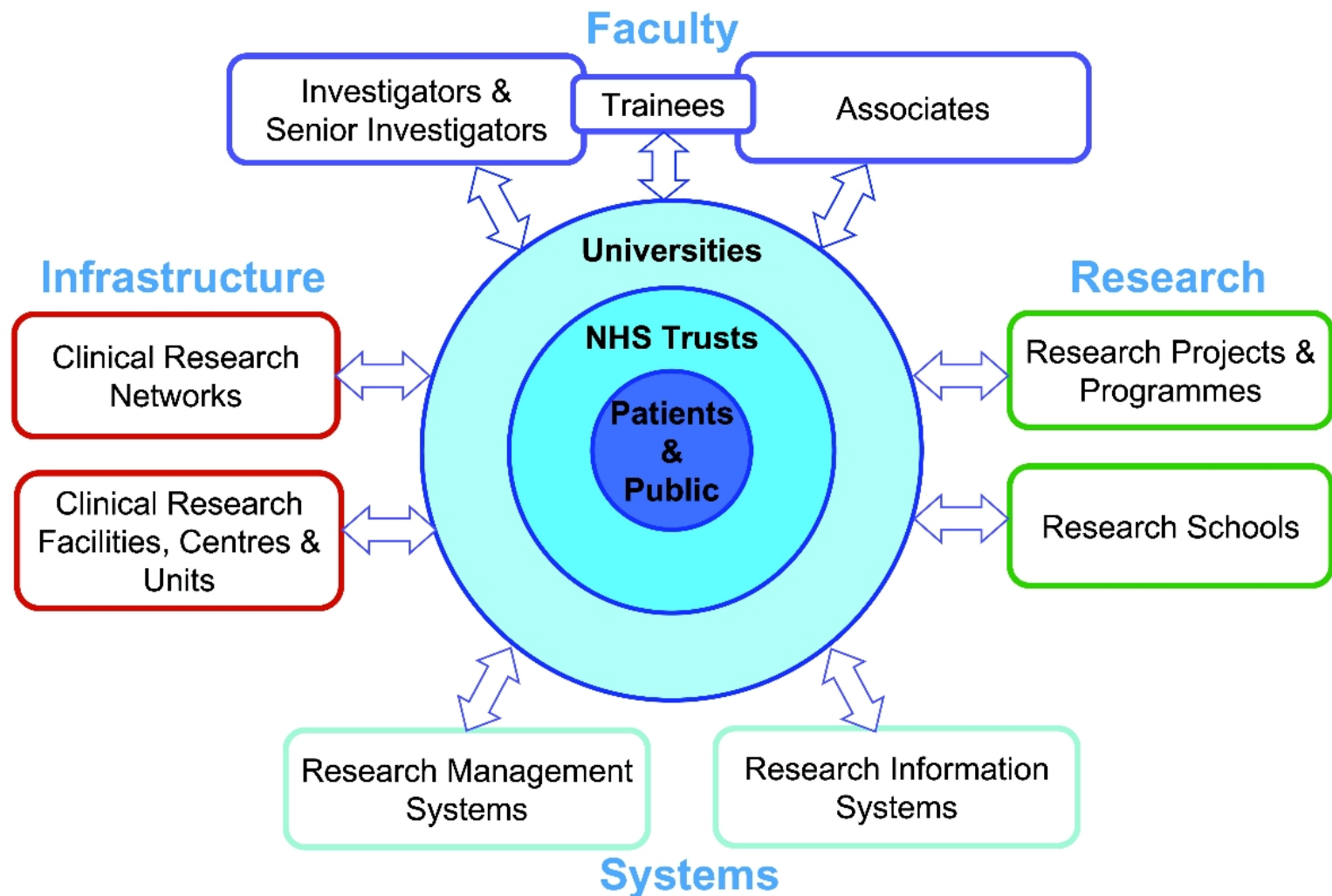

# NIHR Annual Report



Research, and becoming involved in research, has changed the way I manage my condition and has led to me more fit and healthy.

## Patients and the public – taking part in research

The NIHR Clinical Research Network provides relevant opportunities to participate in research. Through thousands of CRN nurses and other staff based in hospitals and surgeries across England, the network identifies NHS patients who may be suitable for particular studies. It approaches them to take part in clinical research that will contribute to a better understanding of their condition. It is a service that is available for the future.

In 2012/13, the NIHR Clinical Research Network supported 171 new studies – a 17% increase on the previous year.

- recruited more than 630,000 patients into studies – an increase of 17% on the previous year. This record figure means that the Network has tripled the annual number of patients engaged in clinical research since its records began just six years ago.
- The number of new studies supported by the network also increased by 17% on the previous year.

## Patients' experiences

Many patients find that taking part in research studies has made a major difference to how they cope with their condition and the subsequent improvements to their quality of life. Many have become important ambassadors for research, inspiring the research and the work of the team, and persuading other patients to become involved.

"... the most valuable outcome of my involvement in health research is to get me back – a person I mislaid for a few years following a major stroke."

Chris Peters, 28, lives in West Sussex and was diagnosed with Type 1 diabetes at the age of 14. He has been involved in research since then.

"Participating in research has given me a positive out of a pretty negative situation by enabling me to turn a disability into an ability. But it has given me much more than that: the more I contribute, the more I understand and the more I improve. Taking part in research has turned my life around and given me a reason to live a rewarding life again by helping to restore my self-confidence and believe that I still have qualities and skills that can help other people."

"Research... has given me the opportunity to meet people that have the same condition. It's been great to share experiences with others who are going through the same process."

"I would thoroughly recommend everyone receiving treatment to ask their consultant if there are any trials that they can assist with. Most of the time there are trials that are looking to find participants. It's been to see more research happening in diabetes."

## Involving patients and the public in research

The NIHR wants more people to be able to choose to take part in clinical research and this is supported by the 2012 Health and Social Care Act. We also want to help people to be able to use research evidence so that they can better understand their care and treatment. To bring leadership and focus to this agenda, the NIHR appointed Simon Denegri as the NIHR National Director for Public Participation and Engagement in Research in addition to his role as Chair of NIHR's INVOLVE programme.

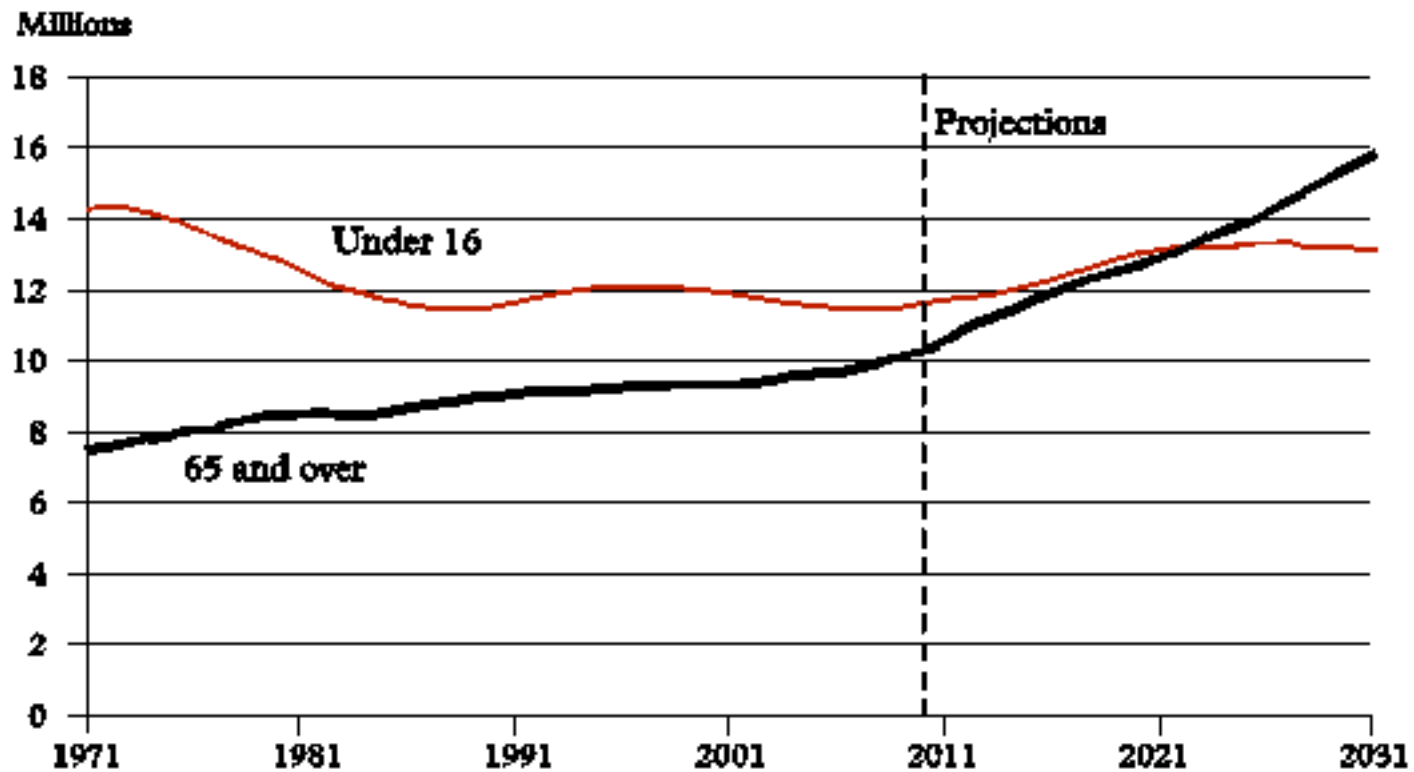
